Kriste Lindenmeyer, is a Professor and Chair of the Department of History at UMBC.

Professor Lindenmeyer's research and teaching focus on U.S. social history with an emphasis on, the history of childhood, and women and gender during the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. She is the author of *The Greatest Generation Grows Up: American Childhood and Youth in the 1930s*, and *A Right to Childhood: The U.S. Children's Bureau and Child Welfare, 1912-1946*. She is editor of *Ordinary Women, Extraordinary Lives: Women in American History*, and co-editor with Andrew Kersten for *Politics and Progress: American Society and the State since 1865*.
